

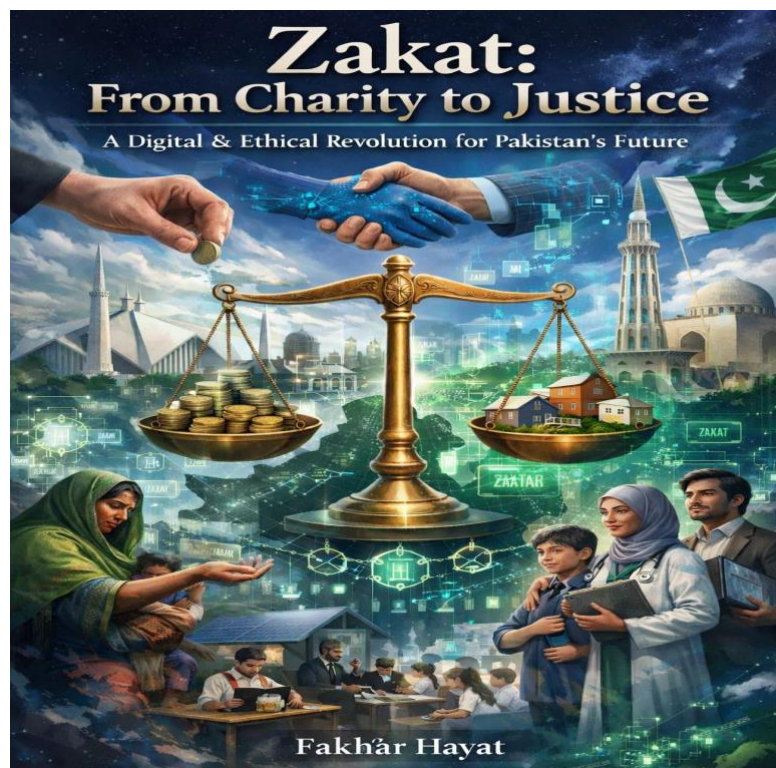
Zakat: From Charity to Justice “ A Digital & Ethical Revolution for Pakistan’s Future”
